A Time to Mourn – Lesson 10 Of Wells and Worship

Stages of Acceptance

- In God's Healing for Life's Losses, Kelleman divides the acceptance into four "Stages of Hope" that help bring healing.
 - o These stages, with their typical and Christian responses, are:
 - Regrouping Waiting
 - Deadening Wailing
 - Despairing/Doubting Weaving
 - Digging Cisterns Worshiping

Digging Cisterns

- In the times of the Bible there were only a handful of ways to have water: live near a source of freshwater, dig a well, or have cisterns to catch and hold rainwater.
- Jeremiah 2:13 uses the imagery of cisterns to illustrate how God's people had turned away from Him to their own strength.
- In essence, we turn to our strength and turn away from the overflowing fountain of God's grace.
- When we rely on our ourselves, we are left thirsty and unsatisfied from an insufficient and often polluted source.
- For long-term recovery and even prosperity we must have a source of strength greater than ourselves.

The Christian Response

- As Christians, we do not have to rely on our own strength and instead go to God.
- We have a choice: we can allow our sufferings to drain us dry or we can draw nigh to God who strengthens us.

- In doing so, we do not focus on what God is or even who God is but rather on God Himself. – Psalm 73:25
- God works through our suffering to bring us back to Him Psalm 42, I Peter 1:6-8
 This is infinitely better than the "acceptance" the world offers.
- Kelleman defines *worship* as "wanting God more than wanting relief", "finding God even when you don't find answers", and "walking with God in the dark and having Him as the light of your soul".

The Rest of the Story

- While we are in this world, we are guaranteed that there will be troubles to face John 16:33
- But we have a greater promise that one day "God shall wipe away all tears from their eyes" – Revelation 21:4
- While the Christian may be assured of a sure future in Heaven, the road we walk and the heartaches we carry often feel like a roller coaster of highs and lows.
- No matter what we face, no matter the heartache, no matter the grief we have a Savior to lean on for support – Matthew 11:28.
