## Hymn Study O Little Town of Bethlehem

## **Background**

- Author Phillips Brooks (1835-1891)
  - o Episcopalian, one of the most popular preachers of his day.
  - o Led Trinity Church in Boston from 1869-1891.
- Tune
  - There are two tunes traditionally used with this song.
  - ST. LOUIS used in the U.S.
    - Written by Trinity Church's organist, Lewis Redner
    - Written the night before its first practice.
  - FOREST GREEN used in the U.K.
    - Based on an English folk song called "The Ploughboy's Dream"
    - Adapted into a hymn tune by Ralph Vaughan Williams in 1906.
- History
  - Inspired by Brooks' visit to the Holy Land in 1865, which included being in Bethlehem on Christmas Eve.
  - Written in 1868 for the Sunday School children to sing in a program at Trinity Church
  - o Printed in leaflet form shortly after its debut, then in *Church Porch* in 1874.
- Analysis
  - o Meter Irregular, 8.6.8.6.7.6.8.6.
  - Rhyme ABCBDEFE or ABCB x2
  - o Brooks' approach to the Nativity is romanticized and deeply intimate, linking the quiet arrival of Christ on earth with personal salvation.

## **Text Analysis**

- Verse 1
  - o O little town of Bethlehem, how still we see thee lie:
    - Micah 5:2, Matthew 2:6
  - Above thy deep and dreamless sleep, the silent stars go by;
  - Yet in thy dark streets shineth, the Everlasting Light;
    - Isaiah 60:19-20, John 1:4-5
  - The hopes and fears of all the years are met in thee tonight.
- Verse 2
  - For Christ is born of Mary, and gathered all above,
    - Luke 2:4-7, Matthew 1:18-25
  - While mortals sleep, the angels keep their watch of wondering love.
    - Luke 2:8-14

- o O morning stars, together, proclaim the holy birth!
  - Job 38:7
- And praises sing to God the King and peace to men on earth.
  - Luke 2:14
- Verse 3
  - o How silently, how silently the wondrous gift is giv'n;
    - We shift here from the historical birth of Christ to the spiritual New Birth.
    - Isaiah 53:2, John 3:16, Romans 6:23
  - So God imparts to human hearts the blessing of His heaven;
    - John 3:16, Ephesians 2:8-9, Romans 15:29
  - No ear may hear His coming, but in this world of sin,
  - o Where meek souls will receive Him still the dear Christ enters in.
    - Matthew 5:5, Revelation 3:20
- Verse 4 Not Used
  - Where children pure and happy, pray to the blessed Child:
    - Describing children as "pure" is more romantic than Scriptural Romans 3:10, etc.
    - Matthew 19:13-14
  - Where Misery cries out to Thee, Son of the undefiled;
    - Lamentations 3:19
  - Where Charity stands watching, and Faith holds wide the door,
    - Revelation 3:20,
  - o The dark night wakes, the glory breaks, and Christmas comes once more.
    - Not that Christ is born anew physically, but that He moves to meet our spiritual needs just as He did in His arrival at Bethlehem.
- Verse 5
  - O Holy Child of Bethlehem! Descend to us, we pray,
    - Acts 4:27-30
  - Cast out our sin, and enter in, Be born in us today;
    - The metaphor of salvation as Christ being born within us is not strictly Scriptural. I could not find such a comparison in the Bible but could have missed it. John 3 speaks of the sinner being born again, but not Christ being born in us. This does not make the metaphor invalid but does lend caution to its use.
    - Ephesians 3:17
  - We hear the Christmas angels the great glad tidings tell;
    - Luke 2:10-14
  - o O come to us, abide with us, Our Lord Emmanuel!
    - Isaiah 7:14
